Dear Parents and Carers,

We are extremely grateful that nobody was seriously hurt, and as a Catholic community, we give thanks to God for His protection and loving presence. Moments like this remind us of how closely God walks with us and how important it is to support one another with kindness and empathy.

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### **✦ A Wonderful Start to the Term**

Despite the awful weather this term — snow, ice and heavy rain — and the many occasions when the children have had to remain indoors for break times, the term has got off to a truly excellent start.

Our children have shown:

- A strong eagerness to learn

We would like to celebrate the beautiful work of our Year 6 children, who each week plan, prepare and lead our Wednesday Word assembly. They choose Scripture readings, develop thoughtful reflections, write prayers, and guide the whole school in worship.

They do this supremely well, showing reverence, maturity and confidence. Their leadership continues to inspire our younger pupils and enrich our school's spiritual life.

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### ✦ **Class Liturgies Across the School**

Every class, from Reception to Year 6, takes an active part in preparing their class liturgy. The children:

- Set the scene for a peaceful, reflective atmosphere
- Pause to become closer to God
- Offer prayers of thanks
- Read from Scripture
- Participate with growing confidence

These liturgies have become one of the most treasured moments of our week. It is a privilege to gather together in faith, stillness and unity...a moment all staff and pupils truly value.

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### ✦ **The Importance of Good School Attendance**

As we move through the term, we would like to take a moment to highlight the importance of good attendance for every child. Being in school every day makes a significant difference to a child's learning, confidence, and overall wellbeing. When children attend regularly, they:



- Keep up with their learning more easily
- Build strong friendships and social confidence
- Develop positive routines and good learning habits
- Take full advantage of the rich experiences school offers
- Feel more secure, settled, and connected to their class

Even small amounts of missed time can add up, making it harder for children to stay on track. The earlier we build strong attendance habits, the more successful children will feel — both academically and emotionally.

We understand that children sometimes need to be absent due to illness, and of course we always want them to rest and recover properly. But wherever possible, we ask for full attendance to ensure that every child receives the very best start each day.

Your support in getting children to school on time, every day is greatly appreciated. Together, we can help our pupils thrive, grow in confidence, and make the most of every learning opportunity God has placed before them.

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### ✦ Family Time for Staff

Just as the children benefit from moments of prayer and reflection, our staff also gather regularly for what we call Family Time. This is a special opportunity for teachers and support staff to:

- Share Scripture
- Pray together and for our children in school and their families
- Reflect on things they are grateful for
- Support one another with kindness and openness

This time strengthens our ethos and deepens our relationships. We see ourselves as a family, and you, our parents and carers, are an important part of that family.

Like every family, we experience ups and downs, but we support one another through thick and thin, living out God's Word and striving to show the care, love, and compassion that Jesus calls us to share.

## ✦ **Formation of the Child – Growing in Faith Together**

One of the most important parts of our mission as a Catholic school is the formation of the whole child. This means helping every child grow spiritually, morally, emotionally, and socially so they can become the person God is calling them to be.

Across the school, children experience daily moments that deepen their relationship with God. Through prayer, reflection, class liturgies, Scripture, and the celebration of the liturgical year, they are developing confidence as young people of faith who can pray, reflect, and talk about their beliefs with growing assurance.

Our approach also nurtures children's moral development. They learn about kindness, dignity, respect, forgiveness, and the importance of caring for others, living out Gospel values in their friendships, play, and everyday choices. Through leadership roles such as Faith Council, Mini Vinnies, Eco-Team, and playground guardians (buddies), they grow in service, empathy and responsibility.

We also place great importance on emotional and social formation. Children are supported to express gratitude, explore their feelings, and show compassion to others. Our pastoral approach ensures they feel safe, valued, and loved. They are encouraged to recognise the gifts God has given them and to use these gifts to make a positive difference.

Through our curriculum, acts of charity, and wider school life, children learn to connect their faith with the world around them - showing care for creation, promoting justice, and understanding the dignity of every person.

All of these experiences help our pupils become thoughtful, confident, faith-filled individuals who bring joy to our school community. It is a privilege to walk alongside them as they grow in faith, character, and the knowledge that they are deeply loved by God.
